Kensington Cattle to host GAA Fall Sale

The Georgia Angus Association (GAA) Board of Directors wish to thank Kensington Cattle Co. for agreeing to host the association's state fall sale on Saturday, December 4, 2010 in Molena, Ga.

The GAA is currently taking nominations for the sale. Consignors must be a member in good standing of the GAA. Priority on consignments will be given to 3 in 1 packages (cow with a newborn calf at side or cow soon to calve along with yearling heifer); and cow with weaning age heifer calf at side. Cows with bull calves and excellent quality bred or open heifers will also be accepted. No single bulls may be consigned. It is strongly suggested that cows be A.I. sired with A.I. calves by side. The maximum age on cows is 7-years-old. Heifers born prior to January 1, 2009 must be examined safe in calf. Cows with calves by side born prior to July 1, 2010 must be rebred and examined safe in calf if time permits. Frozen embryos and pregnant recipients from very select matings of superior quality and a limited amount of rare semen will be accepted at the discretion of the committee.

What 'lean' means in beef marketing

Healthy eating is a growing concern for many Americans. The market is flooded with food options boasting "reduced fat," "low fat" or "no fat." Meat products join in, to the extent they can be described as "lean."

Meats offer many benefits, including some essential dietary fats. "They are an incredible source of protein, and all the amino acids that are needed for health," says Dr. Betsy Booren, director of scientific affairs for the American Meat Institute Foundation. "They also have nutrients like iron, zinc, niacin, selenium, riboflavin and other B vitamins."

But to be considered "lean" by USDA definition, meat must contain less than 10 grams total fat, 4.5 grams or less of saturated fat and less than 90 milligrams of cholesterol per serving.

All of the hype about fat has led some consumers to believe meat cannot be healthy if it tastes good. They might think the only way to get lean beef is to buy from the lower-grade Select case. But flavor does not have to be the sacrificial lamb of healthy eating.

Lots of high-quality cuts of beef are "lean" as well. For example, the Certified Angus Beef® (CAB®) brand is known for full flavor but has 24 cuts that also hit the lean beef target. Those range from roasts and brisket to tenderloin steak.

"A lot of processed products advertised as lean, especially the cheaper ones, don't have much flavor because they are made with soy and added water to dilute the fat," says Mark Gwin quality control and research and development manager for CAB. "I'd rather enjoy more flavor in a balanced diet and have a glass of water on the side," he adds.

"Intramuscular fat (IMF), or marbling, largely determines beef carcass value," says Texas A&M University meat biologist Stephen Smith. "Beef with

Cattle will be screened prior to the sale. The committee is looking at screening cattle sometime in September. Consignors will be notified of the screening schedule prior to any visits. GAA Board Minutes

The GAA board of directors met Friday, June 4, 2010 in Perry at the Southern National Angus Show. The following highlights the information that was discussed.

Banquet - The board agreed to hold the next GAA Annual Meeting and Banquet on January 29, 2011 at The Classic Center in Athens, Ga. More information about the banquet will be available at a later date.

Georgia Fall Sale - The board decided to look into holding the fall sale in December and are working with a farm to host the sale. More information about the sale and nominations would be available in the July/August issue of *Cow Chips*.

Honorary/Hall of Fame Award - The committee has already discussed several nominations for the 2011 awards. It was decided that final selections would be made at the fall board meeting.

Junior Activities - Georgia juniors are busy with summer activities. More than 20 head would be exhibited from Georgia during the National Junior Angus Show (NJAS). The GJAA has purchased \$5,000 worth of embryo lottery tickets, the national fundraiser of the NJAS. Georgia juniors would be participating in the Leaders Engaged in Angus Development conference later this summer in Nashville, Tenn.

Membership/Angus Promotion - To date, there are 320 members of the GAA. The committee is working on a display during the Sunbelt Ag Expo in October to promote Angus cattle and the state association. The committee is seeking a farm to put Angus cattle on display.

Resources - The 2010-2011 GAA Membership Directories were hot off the press! The association grossed more than \$20,000 in ad sales.

Southern National Angus Show - Approximately 90 head of cattle had checked-in for this year's event! The committee thanked everyone that sponsored awards or brought items for the silent auction. Christy Page discussed the Georgia Angus Auxiliary Reception that would take place later that evening and invited all board members to attend.

more marbling tastes better to most people."

"The difference in total fat percentage between Select and Choice is only between 2% and 3%," Gwin says. "When consumers purchase less-marbled, Select cuts, they are giving up a lot of palatability, texture and quality for a very small difference in that total."

Marbling can offer more than improved taste. "There's a health benefit to eating well-marbled beef, compared to the lower-grading kind," Smith says. Beef with more marbling contains more oleic acid, and it has been shown that oleic acid can decrease LDL cholesterol. The levels of saturated and trans-fatty acids in beef decrease with more oleic acid.


Most lean beef cuts come from the round or the chuck, but other products like the brisket or 95% lean ground beef are included in the category as well.

However, not all lean beef is equal.

Smith and a team of researchers found the brisket contained high levels of oleic acid while the plate and the flank had more saturated fat than any of the others they studied.

Even though lean meats are considered a healthy food product, Booren advises consumers not to get carried away with eliminating fat in their diet. "Fats sometimes get a bad rap, but having a level of fat, whether it's saturated or unsaturated, is necessary for healthy living also," she says.

Consumers can still maintain healthy diets while enjoying meats that fall just outside of the lean category. "If people like the flavor and the palatability of some cuts of the higher grade beef, they need to look at portion size," Booren says.

7. All cattle will be screened prior to the sale. Consignors will be notified of the screening schedule prior to any visits.
8. Selection of cattle will be based on type and depth of pedigree. Quality, performance and EPDs will be the number one priority.
9. Cattle may be exhibited penned or haltered. Cattle may be fitted as desired.
10. Due to the genetic defect issues, Arthrogyposis Multiplex (AM) and Neuropathic Hydrocephalus (NH), sale management encourages all of our consignors to take responsibility to have any cattle with known ancesetory to these genetics tested prior to the sale. This will give our association and our sale the upmost integrity and buyers' confidence in purchasing these cattle in the sale.
11. Original Registration certificates must be signed and turned over to the Georgia Angus Association, if selected for the sale, before sale date.
12. The American Angus Hall of Fame will manage the sale.
